


"Our faith is a living thing precisely because it walks hand in hand with doubt. If there was only certainty and no doubt, there would be no mystery, and therefore no need for faith."

This film, in truth, is not about women or feminism at all, despite incorporating elements that depict women in relation to the church, Christianity, and, above all, men. Instead, its core focus lies in the rivalry among the Cardinals during a high-stakes contest. A twisty, subversive thriller, the film's enigmatic atmosphere grips you from start to finish. However, its most striking element is its subtlety. Just as the Cardinals suppress the truth, the director deliberately conceals key details from the audience, using the camera to obscure crucial moments.

The film does not allow us to clearly distinguish the honest from the serpentine; instead, it forces us into a state of permanent doubt. Clues are simultaneously revealed and hidden, leaving viewers to make their own judgments. The responsibility of labeling, trusting, and choosing sides falls squarely on the audience. Until the final scene, uncertainty lingers beside you; you cannot fully trust anyone on screen. Yet, that is precisely the point. As Cardinal Lawrance articulates in his speech:

"If there was only certainty and no doubt, there would be no mystery, and therefore no need for faith."

Conclave is a bold, unsettling production, a piercing critique of faith, religion, honesty, the church, and the communities it fosters.

It is a challenging film to digest. But for me, its most remarkable—and most subtly embedded—theme is its treatment of women. The film subtly suggests that advocating for women's rights is not seen as virtuous within this world. Women cannot be equal; they cannot even be a subject of discussion for a "good" pope. Cardinal Bellini, who resists his selection, employs these very arguments to disqualify himself. His darkly humorous speech makes it clear: supporting women is a dangerous stance when speaking on behalf of the church.

From this moment onward, the film's feminist undercurrents become undeniable. When the contest concludes and the new pope is chosen, the film delivers its most striking and overtly antifeminist message. Throughout the story, the Cardinals are depicted as deeply flawed—liars, backstabbers, pedophiles, false accusers, and more. Yet, the church extends forgiveness to all, for in its doctrine, man is created to sin so that he may seek redemption. Except one thing.

Watch closely as the film reaches its climax. Observe Cardinal Lawrance's physical and emotional reaction to a single revelation. No prior truth has ever brought him to his knees. No fact has ever shaken him, except for one. **Femininity**.

Parks and Recreation



There are many conversations to be had about the famous sitcom Parks and Recreation. One can certainly find countless texts, essays, YouTube videos appreciating the show's very unique characters, setting, themes, camera work, 4th wall breaks and so on. But the purpose of this text in particular is to have a conversation about the most underappreciated aspect of this brilliant show... Its near perfect representation of American society and institutions.

To start off, the setting of this show is incredibly unique. It's not a bar, not a workplace, not a college campus, not a booming metropolitan city like New York, The setting is a Parks and Recreation department of a government office in a fictional town called Pawnee. Pawnee is literally the worst, the most disappointing town America can offer. Despite its cartoonishly high obesity, illiteracy rates, our main protagonist Leslie, a government official in this department loves this town more than anything. Her love for and dedication to public service for the people of this town and the struggle she has to go through is the perfect mirror that will reflect American society.

Because of the high obesity rate, her efforts to introduce a sugar tax for fast food restaurants cause business owners and the wealthy to conduct smear campaigns against her because the tax would destroy their profits. To help the poor, unprivileged, regular townsfolk, she requests additional budget from the federal government for services such as public parks, utilities, education and employment programs. But those requests constantly get blocked by other wealthy city congressmen because they are also wealthy business and landowners who protect their interests. Even her free public school lunch program gets blocked because she refuses to share her bathroom with another congressman. While fighting against all of this and everything else Leslie's personal life could possibly throw at her, she also never gets the appreciation she deserves from the regular people because of all the lies, dirt and smear her enemies throw at her.



Leslie's love for her town, her townsfolk, public service and government affairs are hard to describe with words. It is impossible for someone to have all this passion for public service. But this is basically the entire point. The only way to help the regular people, the only way to "get things done" in the American local and federal government is to have thousands of Leslies but ironically it's impossible to have even one. She is designed to be cartoonishly enthusiastic and devoted.

The institutions in America are hardwired to protect the interests of the most wealthy at all times. The people who occupy these institutions and these positions of power are overwhelmingly the people who know nothing but to worship the profit motive of big businesses and even themselves. And even the regular American people are propagandized into protecting the interests of the wealthy rather than protecting the interests of themselves. They don't see having a good future education, healthcare, job opportunities or infrastructure as 'freedom'. Instead, they see freedom and "liberty" as the freedom for the wealthy to poison, harm, steal and do whatever they want with no regulations whatsoever.

The way Parks and Rec. depicts how things are run in American society in such a subtle but a humorous way, and needs to be heavily appreciated and talked about as it's one of the best examples of a social, cultural critique of America in the form of a sitcom.


The Secret Olarden

Myths of Rebirth and Renewal

Throughout history-long before calendars and weather forecasts- people turned to stories, gods, and traditions to explain why winter faded and life returned.

From Persephone's return in Greek mythology to Osiris's resurrection in Egyptian legend, and the Turkic god Ulgen's influence on nature, cultures have found meaningful ways to welcome spring. Different mythologies celebrate the arrival of spring after months of cold and darkness, as the world slowly awakens—flowers bloom, trees turn green, the air becomes fresher, and the colors brighten. The warmth of the sun returns, bringing the same excitement people still feel today.



Greek

The Abduction of Persephone is a famous Greek myth that explains why we have seasons. One day while Persephone was picking flowers, Hades took her away to the Underworld. Her mother, Demeter, was heartbroken and, in her grief, caused the crops to stop growing. That's why winter arrived according to the myth. In order to fix the situation and prevent the world from starving, Zeus sends Hermes to bring Persephone back but before she left, Hades tricked her into eating pomegranate seeds, which meant she had to return to the Underworld for part of the year.

So, Persephone would spend half the year with Hades (fall and winter) and the other half with Demeter (spring and summer). Her return to the surface marked the blooming of flowers, warmer weather, and the renewal of life, symbolizing the arrival of spring.

Turkic

Ulgen is believed to bless the earth with warmth and life-giving energy, allowing the crops to grow, restoring fertility to the land after winter. His influence symbolizes nature's renewal, bringing growth to crops, animals, and the earth itself. This divine act of regeneration ties into spring's themes of rebirth and prosperity, celebrated in festivals like Nevruz, where Ulgen's role ensures abundance and balance for the coming season. His blessings are seen as essential for the successful passage of winter into spring, making him a central figure in Turkic myths surrounding the season.




Egypt
